Proposed Changes to CICP

The Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Financing (HCPF) is proposing key changes to the Colorado Indigent Care Program (CICP) in 2017. The proposal would change CICP into a grants program where clinics and hospitals would be the qualifying entities for funding instead of individuals. IRS Guidance on Dual Medicaid or Medicare and Marketplace Enrollment

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) revised the <u>Affordable Care Act Return Preparer Best Practices sheet</u> to reflect new guidance regarding those who are dually enrolled in both marketplace coverage and Medicaid or Medicare. The guidance clarifies that individuals must end marketplace coverage if eligible for Medicaid or Medicare by the fourth calendar month after becoming eligible.

IRS Guidance on Letters About Premium Tax Credits

Some taxpayers will receive a <u>0012C letter</u> from the IRS about the reconciliation of the advanced premium tax credit. Please note that all consumers who receive the letter MUST respond to the IRS, even if they believe they are receiving the letter in error.

New Federal Guidance Clarifies Health Coverage Options for Criminal Justice-Involved Individuals

Federal guidance was issued earlier this month that clarifies coverage options for people who have been involved in the criminal justice system. The <u>letter to State Health Officials</u> from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services and the <u>Frequently Asked Questions document for marketplace coverage</u> issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services specify that people who are living in halfway houses are <u>not</u> considered incarcerated. This clarification means that people living in halfway houses may be eligible for Medicaid or for marketplace coverage.

HCPF and Connect for Health Colorado are still determining how these clarifications will play out in Colorado, and <u>no systems changes have been made yet</u>. CKF will continue to follow this issue and will provide updates as more information becomes available.

Reminders

What is the Fee for Not Having Health Insurance in 2016?

The fee for not having health insurance in 2016 is calculated as the *higher* result using two different methods:

- 2.5 percent of household income. This method uses the modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) of the tax filer, the tax filer's spouse (if filing jointly), and any dependents who are required to file a tax return. Only the part of the household income above the yearly tax filing threshold is counted (\$10,150 for individuals, \$20,300 for couples filing jointly in 2014, the most recent year available). The maximum fee using this method cannot exceed the total yearly premium for the national average price of a bronze plan sold through the marketplace (in 2015, this was \$2,484 for an individual, and \$12,240 for a family with five or more members).
- \$695 per adult, and \$347.50 per child under 18 (not to exceed \$2,085 for a family).
 The fee is only applied to the people in the household who do not have insurance coverage.

If a person has coverage for part of the year, the fee is 1/12 of the annual amount for each month the person (or his/her tax dependents) do not have coverage. If the person is uncovered Colorado Covering Kids and Families (CKF) Coalition Update

for only one or two months, they will not have to pay the fee at all. The fee is due when the person files their federal tax return for the year in which they were not covered. Learn more on the IRS website here.

What is the Open Enrollment Period for 2017 Health Insurance Coverage?

Open enrollment is the yearly period when people can enroll in a private health insurance plan. For 2017 coverage, the open enrollment period is **November 1, 2016, to January 31, 2017**. Certain <u>qualifying life change events</u> may qualify someone for a <u>Special Enrollment Period</u> (SEP), which would allow them to enroll outside of the open enrollment period. Medicaid and Child Health Plan *Plus* (CHP+) do not have an open enrollment period, and individuals and families can apply and enroll at any time during the year.
