Quarterly Health First Colorado and CHP+ Enrollment Analysis

CKF reviews adult's and children's enrollment in Health First Colorado (Colorado's Medicaid Program) and Child Health Plan *Plus* (CHP+) on a quarterly basis. CKF's new Quarterly Health First Colorado and CHP+ Enrollment Analysis highlights enrollment trends observed in the first quarter of 2018. The analysis found that the Health First Colorado children's caseload decreased by two percent, while the CHP+ caseload increased by 10 percent. Click [here](#) to review the analysis.

Policy Updates

DOI Timeline for 2019 Health Insurance Plans

The Colorado Division of Insurance (DOI) has finalized the timeline for health insurance companies to file their plans and premiums for the individual and small group markets for the 2019 plan year. The timeline includes deadlines for health insurance companies, as well as dates when the DOI will make information about approved plans and premiums available to the public. Proposed Rescission Package Includes Cuts to CHIP

The Trump administration has proposed federal budget cuts that would take back 15 billion dollars of previously approved funding for federal programs. The proposal, referred to as a rescission package, includes a seven billion dollar cut to the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) budget. The cuts would target two buckets of CHIP funding: the Child Enrollment Contingency Fund, and unused state allotment funds. The Child Enrollment Contingency Fund, otherwise known as the "rainy day fund", was put in place to help prevent states from running out of money if they experience a sudden increase in CHIP enrollments. The state allotment funds include wiggle room in case states go over their budget. The Congressional Budget Office published a [letter](#) stating that they do not expect the proposed rescission package to affect payments to states over the next ten years. According to an [article](#) by Kaiser Health News, however, child health advocates are concerned about this proposal going forward so soon after states had to use the contingency fund to maintain their CHIP programs.

New Public Charge Resources from CBPP

The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities (CBPP) released two new papers on the issue of

public charge. A public charge is currently defined as a person who is primarily dependent on government for subsistence. An immigrant who is deemed likely to become a public charge can be denied admission to the U.S. or denied the ability to become a lawful permanent resident. The Trump administration may soon release a draft rule that would broaden the range of public benefits that can be used to make public charge determinations. CBPP's two papers on the topic discuss how these rule changes would impact legal immigrants and their families. [The first paper](#) addresses how the inclusion of Earned Income Tax Credits in public charge determinations would discourage lawfully present immigrants from using public benefits. [The second paper](#) addresses how the public charge rule change would be particularly harsh for pregnant women and children.
