SNAP Eligibility IMMIGRATION STATUS

Many mixed status households can qualify for SNAP.

Your household may qualify if you or a family member are a:

- "Humanitarian" immigrant (this includes refugees; asylees; and survivors of trafficking, domestic violence, and other serious crimes)
- Legal permanent resident (under age 18 or with residency for 5+ years)
- Immigrant with a military connection
- U.S. citizen





Applying for SNAP

Colorado.gov/PEAK

- 1. Apply: Submit an application.
- 2. Interview: Complete a phone interview with a county eligibility technician.
- 3. Verify: Submit any requested verifications.

TIPS

- 3 steps should be completed within 30 days.
- Income AND expenses matter for SNAP eligibility. Claim your housing and childcare costs (and medical expenses for older adults and people with disabilities).
- Most SNAP households need to recertify every 6 months.
- Not sure if you qualify? Apply to find out!



WIC

Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children







WIC Eligibility CATEGORICAL

To qualify for WIC, you must live in Colorado and be a:

Women

- Pregnant (during pregnancy and up to 6 weeks after the birth of an infant or the end of the pregnancy
- Postpartum (up to six months after the birth of the infant or the end of the pregnancy)
- Breastfeeding (up to the infant's first birthday)

Infant (up to the infant's first birthday)

Child (up to the child's fifth birthday)



WIC Eligibility INCOME

If you are on Medicaid, TANF, SNAP or FDPIR, you are automatically income eligible. Otherwise, under 185% FPL. See WIC Income Table.

The Expanded Federal Child Tax Credit (CTC)

What is it?

- Temporarily expanded under the American Rescue Plan Act in March
- Increased from \$2,000 to up to \$3,600 for kids 0-17
- Fully refundable. Monthly advance payments in 2021
- Applies to low-income families
- 92% of children are eligible

Potential 40% reduction in child poverty



Addressing Root Causes

Why? Improved family resilience and maternal and infant health outcomes

- Fewer adverse childhood events
- Reduced infant mortality, child maltreatment, trauma
- Improved long-term educational outcomes
- Increased intergenerational health
- Reduced disparities



Immediate Impact

First round of child tax credit payments in July significantly reduced poverty and hunger.

- 24% decline in food insufficiency
- Financial anxiety reduced for 56% of families

How did families spend their credit?

- Food
- Child care
- School-related expenses



Prioritizing Non-filers

Getting the word out:

- Hard-to-reach populations need to hear about the CTC
- Families must be in the IRS system to receive their payments

Who does not file?

- Very low-income families
- New parents
- Immigrant and refugee populations
- Non-English speaking communities
- Rural families



Strategies to Increase Tax Credit Claims

What are we doing in Colorado to connect families to tax credits?

- Outreach and messaging (toolkit)
- 2. Navigator training and support
- 3. Strengthening and referring to VITA sites (free tax help)
- 4. Co-enrollment with SNAP, WIC, child care subsidies, and other assistance programs
- 5. Partnerships



Strategy 1: Outreach



New cash benefit for kids



Did you get your September payment?

It's not too late to file your taxes to begin receiving up to \$3,600 per child under the expanded child tax credit if you qualify.

Don't file taxes?

You can still get these benefits using the non-filers' sign-up portal.

Strategy 2: Co-enrollment

- Bundling tax outreach with other referral services
- Including tax credits in benefits referral
- Leveraging expert resources

Examples

- Head Start
- School-Based Health Centers
- Child care centers
- Leveraging COVID-19 networks
- Pop-up enrollment events, mobile vans
- United Way 2-1-1 call center



Strategy 3: Strengthening Tax Help

Connecting families to free tax assistance

- What is a VITA site? Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA)
- Ensuring taxpayers and navigators have a place to land
- When to refer to a VITA site appointment
- How to refer to VITA



Strategy 4: Navigation and Referral

How to connect families quickly

- What to ask: Do you have kids? Have you heard about the CTC? Are you getting your child tax credit payments? Do you file taxes?
- Refer to <u>getctc.org</u> until November 15th, then to getyourrefund.org
- Materials to help spread the word: give a flyer, QR code, or link
- Connect to expert help as needed
- Keep it simple



Addressing Common Concerns

Removing Barriers

- No earnings or job needed
- Does not affect other benefits
- Mixed documentation families OK
- Can use tax ID number (ITIN) to file; only child needs SS#
- Does not affect immigration status now or in the future



Strategy 5: Partnerships

State level partnerships

 State agencies: Dept. of Revenue, Human Services, Health Care Policy and Financing, CDPHE programs

Community partnerships

- Home visitors, LPHAs, food pantries
- Enrollment events, Clinical settings

Serves low-income families that are in an eligible activity

Colorado Works
CCCAP

Serves families that are participating in Colorado Works

Child Welfare & Protective Services CCCAP

Serves families that are involved in Child Welfare

Low-Income CCCAP

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Low-Income Child Care Program

Serves low-income families that are in an eligible activity that are not participating in Colorado Works or engaged with Child Welfare

Purpose:

To provide eligible households with access to high quality, affordable child care that supports healthy child development and school readiness while promoting household self-sufficiency and informed child care choices.

Eligible children:

Citizens or Qualified Aliens that are in the custody of Adult Caretakers or Teen Parents that are income eligible and are participating in an eligible activity*

Referral/application process:

The family completes a Low Income Child Care Application and submits it to the County of residence for processing

Special Considerations:

- Families experiencing homelessness are provided a 60day stabilization period that allows them extra time to enter into an activity and/or provide necessary verification
- Many counties require cooperation with Child Support Services

*Income eligibility and eligible activity may vary by county

Colorado Works Child Care

Purpose:

To provide employed and work eligible Colorado Works participants with child care in order to participate in their activity.*

Eligible children:

Citizens or Qualified Aliens that are in the custody of Adult Caretakers or Teen Parents that determined work eligible by Colorado Works.

Referral/application process:

The county Colorado Works worker submits a referral on behalf of the family to the county Child Care technician for processing Low-Income CCCAP

Child Welfare & Protective Services CCCAP

Serves families that are involved in Child Welfare



Purpose:

To maintain children in their own homes or in the least restrictive outof-home setting when there are no other child care options available.

Eligible children:

- <u>Child Welfare:</u> Children residing in their biological home, with kin (kinship foster care or non-certified kinship care) or in a foster home
- <u>Protective Services*:</u> Children that have been placed by the county in a foster home, kinship foster home, or non-certified kinship home and have an open child welfare case.

Referral/application process:

The caseworker or designated child welfare staff completes the referral and submits it to child care for processing through CHATS.

*Use of Protective Services is a county option



- Families receiving Low-Income, Colorado Works, or Protective Services Child Care may have a parental fee.
- Amount is determined based on gross income, household size, and the number of children in care.
 - A 20% discount is applied if children attend a provider that have a level 3, 4, or 5
 Colorado Shines Rating.
- Paid directly to the child care provider



- Visit Colorado Shines at <u>www.coloradoshines.com</u> to conduct a search and learn more about choosing the right child care provider
- Family, friends, and neighbors might be eligible to provide care and receive reimbursement.
 Families participating in CCCAP can contact the County Human Services office to ask about or begin the background check process.



AND - Colorado Supplement

Eligibility

- Colorado Resident
- Be approved for SSI
- Pursue and accept all potential income and resources available
- Must be a US or naturalized citizen, or eligible legal permanent resident and lawfully present
- Shelter costs may be considered- Clients who are not receiving maximum SSI benefits due to an ISM are not eligible

Supplemental payment for clients zero - fifty nine, who are receiving SSI and are not receiving the full benefit.




HCA (Home Care Allowance)

Eligibility

- HCA is based on financial need and medical need
- Financial eligibility is determined by the client's income and resources at the county department
- A single entry point case manager is responsible for the medical determination
- The grant issued to the client the client is expected to pay the provider for the services provided

HCA is used to pay a provider for services (such as bathing, dressing, meal preparation and shopping). There are 3 tiered grant payment amounts based on need.





OAP

Eligibility

- Age 60 years and older
- Colorado resident
- Must be a United States or naturalized citizen, or an eligible legal permanent resident and be lawfully present
- Must pursue and accept all other potential income and resources that may be available
- All available income and resources are considered
- Income such as wages, Social Security
 Benefits (SSA), Supplemental Security Income
 (SSI) Veterans Assistance (VA) may reduce the
 amount of the OAP payment
- Shelter costs may be considered

The Old Age Pension (OAP) program, established in the State Constitution in 1937, provides cash benefits to eligible individuals age 60 years and older. The maximum 2021 OAP grant is \$832.

Reporting Requirements

All changes in circumstances must be reported and verified by the 10th of the month following the change.

Certain changes are considered verified upon receipt.






Earned Income Disregards

earned income.

Deduct \$65 from the monthly gross income; and,
Divide the remainder by two (2).
The result is the countable





Unearned Income Disregards

Determine the client's unearned income from all sources.
Subtract any amount received from SSI.
Deduct \$20 from the remainder.

The result is the countable unearned income.

If the client is married, the \$20 disregard shall be split between the couple.

Clients who receive only SSI income receive no disregard.





Colorado Works

An explanation of the available benefits and basic eligibility requirements





Colorado Works is Colorado's implementation of the federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program. It provides a cash payment to clients which can be deposited onto a Colorado EBT card, or direct deposited into the client's checking account or the Key Bank card.

The programs also provides case management services to clients.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA: Household Composition



Required






A child or pregnancy and parents and siblings who live with the child (including the spouse of a pregnant parent and half-siblings who do not receive child support).

Non-parent caretakers and their spouses, stepparents, half-siblings who receive child support, parents of a minor parent, parent/siblings in certain legal custody situations.

Recipients of SSI, adoption subsidies, foster care payments, and Title IV kinship care payments

Child Support income is considered fully when a client submits a new application, however, once a client is determined eligible for Colorado Works, their grant payment is not reduced based on the child support received, allowing families to receive both Colorado Works and child support. For a client who is already receiving Colorado Works, their child support is not considered again unless they receive consistent support (defined as an average of \$500 or more/mo for six consecutive months leading up to their recertification).



TIME LIMIT

Colorado Works BCA is a TANF assistance benefit, which can only be issued for 60 months across all states

Extensions to the time limit can be granted due to hardship





CHILD SUPPORT REFERRAL

Clients must work with Child Support Services to obtain monetary child support

Clients may request that they not be required to pursue child support from the parent of a child in their care for certain reasons, such as domestic violence, pending adoption, or other reasons in the best interest of the child





WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

A primary component of Colorado Works is the requirement to work with a case manager to obtain long-term success and financial stability through work or other means

Case management is not required for optional household members who did not request Colorado Works



A diversion is a one-time (or very short-term recurring) payment to assist the family with a specific crisis situation. The family cannot receive BCA for a certain period of time after a Diversion.

Supportive Payments

A payment issued to a household that already receives BCA or Diversion to assist with additional needs.

Disaster Payments

When a county, the state, or the president declares a disaster, counties can choose to issue disaster payments to impacted clients. These payments can be made separately from or in addition to BCA.





HOW TO APPLY

- 1. Online: Visit www.colorado.gov/peak to apply online. PEAK is a secure website run by the State of Colorado, and is available in both English and Spanish.
- 1. Smartphone: Clients can download the MyCOBenefits App for iPhone or Android.
- 1. In-Person: Visit any County Human Services office to apply and county workers are always available to assist. If unable to visit a County office in person due to reasons such as disability, you may send a trusted representative to apply and be interviewed on your behalf. You must designate that individual as your trusted representative
- 1. Paper: Call any County Department of Human Services office and ask for a paper application to be mailed to you or download the PDF of the application (in English, Spanish and large-print) from the "How to apply" section on our website: https://cdhs.colorado.gov/colorado-works. You can then fax, mail or deliver it in-person to your County Human Services office. Applications are available in English and Spanish
